

LIFE STORY OF Hilda A. Kimmen, 73

Hilda Ann Kimmen, the daughter of Thomas and Magdaline Leinen Schumacher was born May 4, 1911, on a farm east of Portsmouth. She was baptized and received her First Communion at St. Mary's Catholic church in Portsmouth and attended school in Portsmouth from 1917 until 1920.
