## Andrew Klitgaard

Andrew Christian Klitgaard, son of Niels Peter and Anna Christine Andersen Klitgaard was born April 13, 1891 in Haneresler, Denmark. He died Jan. 10, 1977 at Denmark. He dieu -Denmark.
