

Carl H. Rosman, 89

Harlan — Carl Henry Rosman, son of George and Anna Erkmeler Rosman, was born Feb. 23, 1892, on a farm north of Harlan. He was baptized, received his First Communion and confirmation at St. Boniface church in Westphalia. He attended the country school, Campion's Boarding school in Prairie Du Chien, Wisc. and Creighton high school in Omaha. He then helped on the family farm until he was inducted into the Army on Aug. 27, 1918, to serve his country during WW I until June 4, 1919, when he received an honorable discharge and returned to the family farm.

On Dec. 27, 1922, he married Mamie Edith Buman at St. Michael's church in Harlan. Four children were born to this union. After their marriage, they farmed in the Kirkman area, close to his parent's farm, until 1929. They then moved to a farm west of Harlan. After Mrs Rosman's death on Sept. 3, 1968, Carl continued to live on their farm until Oct. of 1980, when he moved to Omaha to reside with his daughter, Rose.

Mr Rosman was a member of St. Michael's church in Harlan. He was also a cattle and hog feeder and was extremely fond of dogs. He died at Lutheran Medical Center in Omaha on Tuesday, April 14, 1981, at age 89 years, 1 month and 21 days.

In addition to his wife and parents, he was preceded in death by five brothers, Frank, Henry, George, Joseph and Rev. Louis Rosman; eight sisters, Mamie Hodapp, Sister M. Crispina, Frances Kirschbaum, Josephine Mertens, Anna Hodapp, Olive Rosman, Loretta Rosman and Carrie Hennes and a granddaughter, Mamie Elizabeth Rosman. Survivors include two sons, Ulrich of Moorhead, and Louis G. of Harlan; two daughters, Rose Betty (Mrs G.O.) Austria of Omaha and Theda (Mrs Joe) Flies of Harlan; 12 grandchildren and three great grandchildren; nieces, nephews and other relatives.

A Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated at St. Michael's church on Saturday, April 18, 1981 with Rev. Richard G. Wagner as celebrant. Burial was in Harlan cemetery with John Flies, Jerry Rosman, James Rosman, Michael Flies, Raymond Flies and Robert Austria serving as pallbearers.
