
Brick School District #4 Bloomfield Township, Winneshiek County

A Little History of the Brick School, District #4 Bloomfield Township, Winneshiek County, Iowa Compiled by Sarah Nelson & Emma Benjegerdes

On May 18, 1883 John S. Mott (John R. Mott's father) leased enough land from his farm for a school and only to continue as Dist. #4 Bloomfield Township until not needed anymore. At that time the land was to be returned to the owner.

On Feb. 26, 1898 the farm was sold to F.W. Benjegerdes and the same rule applied.

On Oct. 16, 1949 F.W. Benjegerdes sold the farm to Henry C. and Emma Benjegerdes and the same rule applied.

In 1953 the school district was reorganized and the school was consolidated with the Postville Public School. It remained open for two years under the supervision of K.T. Cook their superintendant. It was closed in the Fall of 1955.

On Aug. 19, 1956 the ground was returned to its owners Mr. and Mrs. H.C. Benjegerdes. The brick was removed from the building and the frame was moved east of the farm home. Today Emma Benjegerdes has enlarged on the frame and she lives in this beautiful "School House" home.

Bloomfield Township #4 (1946-1950) and Bloomfield Township #7 (1951-1955) By Sarah Nelson

When I started the enrollment was sixteen and when the school closed, because of consolidation to the Postville Community School there were fourteen. I had all grades—kindergarten through eighth grade.

I lived at home and drove each day. In later years each parent sent a hot dish to eat with our regular lunch pail meal. The pupils two at a time carried our drinking water to school from their farm home in a milk can and poured it in a water cooler. We always said a prayer together before our lunch at noon. Being I had all grades the advanced pupils would work with the pupil who needed extra help.

We began each day with the pledge followed by a short prayer—bringing our needs together. Sometimes I wonder how I did it all.

I always started the fire so it would be warm on Monday morning. We used coal for fuel.

I would say we were pretty well equipped in supplies, however each Fall we would have a program consisting of poems, songs and dialogues for the public followed by a box social or sale of food for some special project we needed. This was fun and also good supervised training.

In the spring we would take our lunch and go on a hike through the field to a creek, talking and discussing nature, birds, flowers, trees, etc. Later doing some penmanship on the trip and signs of nature. We had fun and a learning experience. Outdoor games were ante I over, tag, baseball, hide and seek and pump, pump, pull away.

The last day of school we had a picnic at the schoolhouse.

We all had one serious experience at recess one day in the Fall. It had rained and the ground had frozen rough and when running a child fell hitting his head on the rough ground. He got up, but passed out when he got warm in the schoolhouse. We called (good to have a telephone) the parents, took him to the doctor and as it turned out he had a slight concussion. In a day he was back with us. This made us all feel good.

We had a woodchuck which sat on the platform of the porch each morning and evening as I came and left school.

My first check was \$185 and the last \$279. Henry Benjegerdes was the director of the school. Total years taught: thirty-two.

1905

- Pd. \$1.00 to clean the school in the Fall
- Pd. 80¢ for a water pail
- Pd. 10¢ for a dipper
- Pd. 10¢ for each eraser

1906

- Pd. 50¢ for school lawn to be mowed in the Fall
- Pd. 50¢ for a broom

1911

- Pd. 5¢ for a box of matches
- Pd. \$29.00 for a No. 20 round oak stove

1915


- Pd. 35¢ for a washbowl and soap
- Pd. \$22.50 for insurance on schoolhouse for 5 years
- Pd. \$20.00 for four cords of wood

In 1881 a cyclone one day caused the section men who were working on the railroad to run for shelter in the nearby schoolhouse. It was of wood construction. The walls were completely blown off the building and the men were left safe standing on the schoolhouse floor. Later the building was completely reconstructed and the exterior covered with brick which brings us up to the story of the Brick School on the front cover.
